Login information for voting using the PointSolutions app by Turning Technologies will be sent to the email address used to register as a voting member. You will receive **an email** with login information. If you do not receive this email **by Monday, May 20, 2024** email <u>assembly@neos-elca.org</u> **using the email address you registered with** to receive a copy of the email with login information.

If a dummy (non-working) email address was used when registering you MUST email assembly@neos-elca.org and request the login information for the voting app. In the email requesting the voting app login information include: the voting member's first and last name, dummy email (voting app email), and name of congregation and city.

Please note: The email address used for registering will also be used to authenticate registered voting members for the 2024 Business Sessions.

### FROM TURNPIKE VIA RT. 8:

I-80 East to Exit 180 (Rt. 8 South) / Follow Rt. 8 South to Perkins St. Exit / Right on Perkins St. to High St. / Left on High St. / Stay on High St. (one-way street going South) / Knight Center is located on the left at the corner of High & Mill Streets.

## FROM NORTH VIA I-77 & WEST VIA I-76: (review construction update)

I-77 & I-76 (they run concurrently briefly) to Exit 22A VIA I-77 (Main/Broadway/ Downtown) and WEST / You will merge with a one-way side street (South St.) VIA I-76 / Follow South St. to 2<sup>nd</sup> light / At that point all traffic MUST turn left onto Broadway, which is a one-way street going North / Follow Broadway to Mill St. (about 1-1 1/2 miles) / Knight Center is located at the corner on Broadway & Mill St.

## FROM NORTH & SOUTH VIA I-77: (review construction update)

I-71 to I-76 East to Exit 22A (Main/Broadway/Downtown) / (follow directions above) VIA I-77

### FROM SOUTH VIA I-71 & EAST VIA I-76: (review construction update)

I-77 & I-76 to Exit 22A (Main/Broadway/Downtown) / VIA I-77 On the exit ramp, bear right to Broadway / EAST Broadway is a one-way street going North / VIA I-76 Follow Broadway to Mill St. (about 1-1 1/2 miles) Center is at the corner of Broadway & Mill St.

**NOTE:** Parking is **FREE** in all City of Akron parking lots and decks.



### **PROPOSED RULES OF PROCEDURE for the 2024 Synod Assembly**

### I. General Rules

- A. Upon recognition by the chair, a speaker shall identify oneself by name, congregation (or agency or institution), and town (or city).
- B. Chairpersons of standing committees who are not voting members of the synod assembly are accorded voice but not vote on all business relevant to the committees' work.
- C. The Parliamentarian is considered a Synod Assembly Committee of one.
- D. Unless otherwise determined by a two-thirds vote, speeches during debate shall be limited to two (2) minutes.
- E. The chair may bring forward items as necessary or as helpful to the business of the assembly. The Chair may declare such items to be Special Orders for the Day if needed.
- F. Motions shall be submitted to the secretary in writing and presented to the Secretary either on paper at his table or electronically in the Zoom chat.
- G. To afford voting members the option of expressing "no opinion" on a question, the chair will call for yeas, nays, and abstentions.
- H. In the event that the assembly must adjourn before completing its business, all remaining items shall be referred to the synod council for disposition.
- Because of the inability to add voting members after the authorized voting list has been finalized and transmitted to the voting application vendor prior to the assembly, the Credentials Committee will simply and singly report the final number of members authorized to receive voting credentials as the members in attendance at the assembly. The final assembly minutes will also show any information about the number of such individuals who did not at any time join the meeting or vote.

### **II. Nominations and Elections**

A. The consent of all nominees shall have been obtained prior to their nomination. Time constraints prevent distribution of biographical information for persons nominated from the floor. Nominations made from the floor of the assembly shall be submitted by voice and followed up with a written submission to the secretary on paper or the Zoom chat. Since such nominations may be submitted at any time after the opening of the assembly, if no nominations are received prior to the time that the nominations committee has presented its official slate, the chair will declare nominations closed.



- B. Nominees for offices shall be listed in alphabetical order on the first ballot, in two groups. Nominations made prior to the assembly shall be alphabetically listed first, followed by nominations made from the floor. This grouping is necessary for efficient handling of vote counting. On subsequent ballots, listing will be in descending order according to votes received on the previous ballot.
- C. Upon completion of all elections, a summary of the results shall be published.

### III. Consideration of the Budget

Changes to the proposed budget shall be submitted electronically, according to instructions provided in the pre-assembly materials for that purpose, to the Finance Committee by 12 noon on May 15, 2024. The proposed changes shall be sent to <u>lbarbins@neos-elca.org</u>. This will allow the Finance Committee to provide written responses and recommendations, which will be distributed as website materials for assembly action. All proposals shall be in writing and shall include the amount of increase for a specific line item and/or the amount of decrease for a specific line item and the rationale for such change.

### **IV. Consideration of Resolutions**

- A. Resolutions to be considered by the assembly shall be received in writing in the synod office by Monday, April 15, 2024 for consideration by the Committee on Reference and Counsel. The Committee on Reference and Counsel shall report their action on such resolutions to the assembly, whether a recommendation for discussion and Assembly action, reference to an appropriate synod committee, no action, or postponement of further discussion to the next Assembly (with possible interim action, if appropriate). Actions of the Committee on Reference and Counsel shall be final unless the Assembly chooses to discuss such actions by a majority vote.
- B. No resolutions may be submitted after the original deadline date, unless such a resolution is determined by the Reference and Counsel Committee to be of an urgent nature, in which case the committee may recommend to the assembly that debate at the assembly be considered. Such a recommendation for debate shall require a two-thirds vote for approval; if the assembly does not pass an enabling motion, the resolution shall be referred to the synod council. Resolutions of an urgent nature shall be submitted electronically, according to instructions provided at the assembly for that purpose.
- C. The Committee on Reference and Counsel shall also grant or deny permission to distribute material to assembly voting members.







### "Spirit lead me where my trust is without borders."

This is a sign that one of my daughters used to have in her bedroom, and I found it just the other day. It seems like an apt way to sum up the last year in the Office of the Bishop and how we are thinking about the future of our ministry together.

I need to start with the financial health of our synod: to be honest, it has been an ongoing challenge the past 3 years. Over these past years, we have been unraveling a long tradition of an overly complicated accounting system - some of which was not sufficiently explained or understood before our accountant of 30 years left the synod offices in October of 2020. We were forced this year to hire a forensic accountant to sort out the system and to pay our auditors more as we unraveled the threads. Please note, we have received a clean audit for fiscal years ending 2020, 2021, and 2022; there has been no malfeasance. Also, it is important to know that your Finance Committee and Treasurer have been working very hard to get everything to a steady state. Last year we had a deficit of nearly \$229,000 (unaudited) which was fueled in no small part by increased audit and accounting expenses. Of course, this sort of deficit cannot be sustained. We continue to work on contingency plans as well as look for revenue streams besides unrestricted mission support to fund the work we do together and on your behalf.

While our congregations continue to be generous, your generosity is not enough to make up for our costs. There is no doubt that the largest expense we have at the synod offices is no different than in your congregation: salaries and benefits. So, we look for great things from those people. And this year we have not been disappointed as your synod staff has worked hard to resource, accompany, and partner with you in the proclamation of the gospel in northeast Ohio.

We did see staff changes within our offices: we said goodbye to four staff members and hello to three new ones. We give thanks for the gifts that Pastor Smith, Pastor Jackson, and Deacon Schwabe lent to our offices. We look forward to the ministry that Pastor Stufft will do among us. We are blessed with the added capacity for resourcing ministry in lay education and youth and young adult ministries that Deacon Frantz brings to our offices. Sue Tully at the front desk brings joy and laughter to that space and on the phone. Thank you for supporting the work of all these people.

This past year we continued with two previous initiatives: stewardship opportunities and the Dandelion Project. We were pleased to have 8 congregations in which your synod offices invested funds so that they might deepen the stewardship practices of their congregation. We also had 5 congregations participate in Dandelion, Too!, our second iteration of the Dandelion Project. We invested in these congregations as well, helping them to become persistent and prolific proclaimers of the gospel.

Pastor Phillips, Pastor Smith (before she retired), and I listened a lot this past year to congregations and their challenges. To that end, we were able to bring onboard Growing in Faith, our lay school program, for the purpose of empowering and equipping lay people in discipleship. We look forward to the coming year and the ways that this program may be deepened and broadened to equip lay leaders for the priesthood of all believers.



A second thing that came out of that listening was a new hypothesis for what God may be doing in the life of the church. We truly believe that God is up to something in Christ's church - that there is a reforming in the making. Our working hypothesis is that congregations are being called together in groups of 4-6 to be the Body of Christ together. These consortiums or collaboratives of congregations would have a shared mission and vision within their communities. They would be served by a staff of at least 2 pastors and potentially a deacon who would help shepherd the life of the consortium. Each congregation would maintain their own building, their own worship and be led at least in part by a trained lay minister who could effectively and soundly lead worship when one of the pastors or the deacon could not be present.

We tested this hypothesis this spring with groups of people in each conference in events we are calling Project Isaiah 43. These events were very well attended with 45% of our congregations participating. As we collate all the conversation that was engendered at these events, we look towards Synod Assembly when we will go deeper into our findings by furthering conversation among the members of our synod.

The hope of your synod staff is that by the end of the summer we have a proposal for what we think the Holy Spirit is up to in our little corner of God's realm. We do absolutely believe that God is up to something not only in our synod, but in the world. Because that is the nature of our God: a God who is always creating, always renewing. And the nature of Lutheranism has always been a church that is re-forming for the sake of the Gospel.

I would be remiss if I did not thank, with all my heart, the Officers of the Synod and your synod staff. To Bob Emmerich, Treasurer and Kevin Kampfer, Vice President: Thank you for your tireless and thoughtful efforts on behalf of this church. I am so grateful for your gifts, your leadership, and your hours of hard work. To our staff: Thank you for the ways you care for the people of Christ's church and the gifts that you bring to your positions. We would not be where we are today without your gifts and strengths.

And an Gracious God manuaur Spirit lead us where our trust is without borders!

#### TREASURER'S REPORT TO THE 2024 SYNOD ASSEMBLY

The financial information being provided to the Assembly is shown in the budget presentation, which includes the revised budget for 2024-2025, the requested budget for 2025-2026, and draft unaudited financial results for the General Operating Fund for the year ending January 31, 2024.

#### FINANCIAL RESULTS FOR 2024

The Synod outsourced its accounting services to Lutheran Metropolitan Ministries (LMM) in August of 2023. LMM has provided the Synod draft financial statements for year-end 2024. Highlights are as follows:

- Mission Support Income was \$1,130,673, which was \$94,327 below the revised budget for 2023-2024 of \$1,225,000.
- Total Income for the year was \$1,205,220, which includes Synod Assembly Registration fees.
- Total Expenses for the year before depreciation were \$1,433,768, compared to a revised budget of \$1,385,410. ELCA Mission Support expense of \$550,000 and Total Staff expense were in line with the budget. Contract services of \$83,491 were \$48,491 over budget due to higher audit expenses and the engagement of an accounting consultant to assist with the audit preparation.
- The operating loss before depreciation -\$228,906 exceeded the budgeted loss before depreciation of -\$100,211, and the variance can be explained by the shortfall in Mission Support revenue and the higher contract fees for auditing and accounting.

In the past, the Synod charged many expenses directly to the Synod's Restricted Fund Accounts. While this is an acceptable practice, going forward, for better transparency we will include many of these expenses in the operating budget. These expenses will be offset in the income statement under the caption "Funds Released From Restrictions." In 2023-2024 these releases totaled \$27,515.

We have not included investment income or unrealized gains and losses on investments in our operating statement. Income and gains and losses on investments from our PNC Investment portfolio have been credited or debited to the Council Designated PNC Investment Surplus Fund. Investment income and unrealized gains and losses on investments in our ELCA Endowment Fund account have been credited or debited to the Synod's Net Asset Account. In fiscal 2023-2024 the Synod's investment portfolio benefited from a strong stock market and the combined income and unrealized gains net of fees was a positive \$107,019. The prior year was a loss of -\$109,725.

A Budget Deficit Fund is maintained at 16% of budgeted Operating Fund expenditures. At yearend the fund had a starting balance of \$246,285, and the operating loss of -\$228,906 was charged against that balance. A transfer of a like amount was then made from the PNC Investment Surplus Fund to restore the Budget Deficit Fund to the required balance.

#### **AUDITED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

Due to internal accounting issues, the Synod was not able to complete audits of fiscal 2021-2022 and fiscal 2022-2023 until October of 2023. The report for those years is on the Synod's website. In fiscal 2023 the Synod's net assets declined by -\$299,996 before its investment return and - \$409,721 after a negative investment return of -\$109,725. The decline in net assets was due to outflows from Donor Restricted Funds, outflows from the Council Designated funds to cover the



building renovations, and transfers from Council Designated funds to cover the operating loss in the General Fund. Work on the 2023-2024 audit will take place in May, with an expectation the audit will be received in June.

#### LIQUIDITY POSITION

Historically, the Synod has been blessed with a strong cash position and investment portfolio. However, the recurring deficits and normal outflows from the restricted funds have reduced the Synod's cash position, as can be seen from the chart below. During 2023-2024 the Synod sold \$310,000 in securities from the PNC Investment Portfolio to cover outflows, which was partially offset by a \$107,019 improvement in the net market value of the securities.

#### **RESTRUCTURING OF COUNCIL DESIGNATED AND DONOR RESTRICTED FUNDS**

At its meeting on April 13, the Synod Council approved the restructuring of a number of restricted funds. The restructuring 1) eliminated funds whose balances had been exhausted and whose purpose was no longer relevant to the Synod, 2) merged funds that had a similar purpose, 3) converted some donor restricted funds to council designated where the source of funds was not really from a donor and where restrictions were vague or non-existent, and 4) eliminated "project funds" and moved them to the general fund. These changes will be effective as of April 30, 2024.

Your Northeastern Ohio Synod Council met on August 26, 2023 at The Lutheran Center. We began by welcoming and installing our new Synod Secretary and Synod Council Members. We also received a "sneak peek" tour of the renovations made to the building.

<u>A few highlights of our August 26th meeting included:</u>

- **New Staff Member:** We authorized the Executive Committee to issue a call to a new Director of Communication and Formation
- **Synod Assembly:** We approved the venue for our June 1st Synod Assembly. We also appointed members of the 2024 Synod Assembly Planning Committee.
- **Care of Creation:** We considered and created action items from the Care of Creation Resolution referred to your Synod Council by the 2023 NEO Synod Assembly.
- **Financial Policies & Procedures:** We approved the revised Northeastern Ohio Synod Financial Policies and Procedures with endorsement from the Finance Committee.

Your NEO Synod Council next met on October 21, 2023 at Bethel Lutheran in Middleburg Heights. Joined by our Conference Deans, we discussed When Church Stops Working by Andrew Root and Blair D. Bertrand. All other business is reported in the Synod Council Meeting Minutes.

<u>A few highlights of our October 21st meeting included:</u>

- **Vitality Grants:** We approved Congregational Vitality grants for ministries serving in one of the poorest communities in the nation: Calvary, East Cleveland and New Covenant, East Cleveland. We also approved a grant to pay for expenses for the TEEM Leader at New Covenant.
- **Renewal:** We renewed Synod Authorized Worshipping Communities: Oasis, Sagrada Corazon, Iglesia Luterana la Trinidad. We also renewed Mission Developers: Pr. Lisa Arledge and SAM Jorge Uzho.
- **Synod Assembly:** We voted to allow each congregation to bring up to three voting members, provided one of the members is BIPOC, LGBTQIA+, and/or under the age of 30.
- **Leadership Changes:** We welcomed Deacon Jenny Frantz as Director of Communication & Formation. We also said a special thank you to Pastor Angel Jackson for her four years of service as NEOS Candidacy Coordinator.

On January 20, 2024, your NEO Synod Council met on Zoom. Among other business items, synod council learned about Strategic Ministries: congregations in ethnic communities and/or communities experiencing poverty that strengthen strategic, innovative, resourceful ministries enriching the whole Church.



### <u>A few highlights of our January 20th meeting included:</u>

- **Synod Assembly:** We approved deadlines and committees related to the 2024 NEO Synod Assembly. We also looked ahead to potential dates & venues for 2025 and 2026.
- **Budget Matters:** We approved an amended budget for 2024-2025 as recommended by the NEOS Finance Committee.
- **Strategic Ministries:** We identified New Covenant, East Cleveland and Calvary, East Cleveland as strategic ministries for 2024.
- **Care of Creation:** We received a report from the Care of Creation Task Force as they explore the potential for installation of solar panels and publish "Care of Creation" newsletters.

Finally, Synod Council met on April 13, 2024 at Celebration Lutheran in Chardon, Ohio. Among other business items, the council focused on the financial wellbeing of your Northeastern Ohio Synod. After the conclusion of the meeting, we celebrated the installation of Pastor Jonathan Stufft as the new Assistant to the Bishop for Congregational Vitality and Director for Evangelical Mission.

### A few highlights of our April 13th meeting included:

- Youth & Young Adult Ministry Fund: We established a new Donor Designated Fund aimed to fund future Youth & Young Adult Ministry initiatives within our synod.
- **Care of Creation:** We moved to enroll the Lutheran Center in the Cuyahoga Falls Renewable Energy Credits program.
- **Synod Assembly:** We approved a proposed agenda for the 2024 Synod Assembly and recommended Compensation Standards to the business of the Assembly.
- **Budget Matters:** We approved a proposed budget for 2025-2026 as recommended by the NEOS Finance Committee. We reviewed and stewarded changes to some Donor Restricted and Council Designated Funds.

### DEACON EDWARD KIRST | September 8, 1930 - June 6, 2022

Deacon Edward Kirst passed away on June 6, 2022. He was born September 8, 1930, and grew up in Wisconsin. In 1952, he graduated from Concordia Teachers College in River Forest, IL with a Bachelor's in Education. That same year, he was commissioned as a working professional with the English Synod Association of Evangelical Churches in Chicago, IL. In 1985, he obtained his Masters in School Administration from Cleveland State University. While beginning his ministry in the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, Deacon Kirst moved intentionally out of that denomination, into the predecessor bodies of the ELCA, and then became a deacon in the ELCA in 2016.

He was employed as a teacher at First St. John Lutheran in Chicago from 1952-1954. From there, he taught at St. Matthew Lutheran in Garden City, MI, between 1954-1958, where he also became principal. Following his time with St. Matthew, he became employed as a teacher for Messiah Lutheran in Fairview Park, OH, in 1958, becoming principal in 1974. He remained employed there until his retirement in 1995. Throughout his career, he assisted in planning and implementing professional growth conferences for teachers and principals in the Greater Cleveland church schools. In 1991, he was the recipient of the Outstanding Lutheran School Leadership Award.

### THE REV. DANIEL ROSSBACH | November 30, 1946 - September 3, 2022

The Rev. Daniel Rossbach passed away on September 3, 2022. He was born November 30, 1946, in Lethbridge, Alberta, Canada to Darlene (Bolte) and Walter Rossbach. In 1969, he received his B.A. in Social Science and Secondary Education from Kearney State College in Kearney, Nebraska. From there, he also received his M.S. in Counseling Psychology from Kearney State College in 1973, and in 1981, he received his M.Div. from Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque, Iowa. He was ordained at St. John's Lutheran Church in Randolph, Nebraska on October 18, 1981.

He was employed as a drug and alcohol counselor and mental health therapist at Southern Central Community Mental Health Center in Kearney, Nebraska from 1969-1971. From 1981-83, he was a chaplain at the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Detention Center, and from 1983-2018, he was employed as the Director of Pastoral Care at Metro Health, where he created a Pastoral Care department that was used as a model in surrounding hospital systems. Throughout his lifetime, he also held positions as a Protestant chaplain for Cleveland Metropolitan General Hospital, a program coordinator and renaissance effort director for the Kearney Drug and Health Education Committee, and as an instructor of social sciences for Benkelman Public Schools in Benkelman, Nebraska. He retired on July 1, 2018.



# THE REV. CARL WILLIAM CUNFER | July 5, 1932 - November 19, 2023

Reverend Carl William Cunfer passed away Sunday, November 19, 2023.

Born in Slatington, PA on July 5, 1932, he was the son of the late Charles and Mary (Brobst) Cunfer. He graduated from Slatington High School in 1950 then was a proud member of the US Army from 1953-1954, including service in the Korean War. Carl then continued his education, graduating from Wittenberg College in 1959, and Hamma School of Theology (now Trinity Lutheran Seminary) in 1962.

Carl was ordained May 22, 1962 at Zion Lutheran Church in Canton, OH and was called as Pastor of St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Mansfield, OH where he served for 34 and ½ years until his retirement on December 31, 1996.

As an active member of his community, Carl was a member of the Mansfield Area Lutheran Pastors Association and served Mansfield General Hospital as a member of the Pastoral Care Advisory Committee, Institutional Review Board, and Gerontology Committee. ### THE REV. EDWIN RICHARD BOWEN | September 9, 1926 - November 19, 2023

Reverend E. Richard Bowen returned to his heavenly home on November 19, 2023, following a brief illness. His devotion to his family and firm belief in God supported him throughout his life and gave him peace.

He then continued to serve in Northeastern Ohio as a pulpit supply and visitation pastor.

Pastor Bowen was a gentle, loving, caring man who left a permanent impression in the hearts of many. He will be greatly missed by his son, daughter-in-law and friends.

Richard was married to Edeltraud for 61 years before her death in 2010. They had two sons, Gary, who resides in Colorado with wife Kathi, and James who also passed away in 2010.
